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Inventing the Future

Dear Friends,

"The best way to predict the future is to invent it" served as the organizing principle at Xerox's Palo Alto Research Center, which did just that in bringing the modern desktop computer to life with inventions like the graphical user interface, the laser printer and the mouse.

It's no accident that those inventions emerged in the United States. As a country we have played, and continue to play, an outsized role in innovation. Yet, where once America also led the way in educational innovations like the creation of a system of universal high schools, for far too long we have been content merely to applaud and protect those accomplishments instead of continually aiming for better. The good news is that, in communities across the country, complacency is giving way to invention and the future of American education is coming into focus.

In 2023, across the country we saw historic expansions of educational choices, including passage of a universal ESA in North Carolina. In an effort to combat learning loss, dozens of states also expanded tutoring, after-school and summer programs, including in Louisiana where a program was funded to give regular tutoring access to every student in the state. Increasingly, states are enabling students to learn outside the classroom, such as in Hawaii where we passed legislation to expand access to credits for students engaging in learning experiences outside of school. Policymakers are responding to parent demands for greater transparency, such as in Colorado, where we secured the creation of a commission to

improve the state's accountability framework. Finally, a number of states are working to better align career pathways between the K-12 system and the economic needs of their states, including in New Mexico where we created a permanent pathway for tradespeople and professionals to teach.

Even more important than these individual innovations is what they add up to: a whole new type of education system with five interconnected promises to America's students.


- 1. The education that's right for you, because every student learns differently.

2023 Work Streams and Results



Advocate

50CAN's core work has always been supporting local advocates as they strive to build the future of education in their states. Our 10 state campaigns are all led by savvy executive directors who possess deep expertise in policy and politics, collaborate across partisan divisions, have strong local knowledge and work relentlessly to get results every year for kids. Together, our network reaches one in six kids in America and has secured 235 policy wins since the founding of 50CAN in 2011.

In 2023, the local advocates of our network achieved 30 policy wins that lay the foundation for the future of education



The Education That's Right for You

- CarolinaCAN passed a universal ESA, giving every student access to up to \$7,600 for tuition or other educational expenses.
- TEN Colorado implemented a transportation pilot to support students leaving a perennially underperforming district for others in the state.
- TennesseeCAN expanded the reach of the state ESA to Chattanooga, while also securing \$22 million for charter facilities.



Tutoring and Care for All

- Louisiana Kids Matter guaranteed tutoring access for every student in the state at risk of falling behind, and is partnering with the state to pilot daily tutoring in schools.
- JerseyCAN obtained \$6.5 million in the state budget for tutoring students in academic need.
- NewMexicoKidsCAN ensured students will receive research-based literacy instruction by creating a list of state-approved curriculum.
- TennesseeCAN secured the funding for summer learning camps to continue indefinitely.



A World of Open and Connected Learning

• HawaiiKidsCAN expanded computer science classes from high school to the lower grades and created a mandate for the state to determine a process to allow students to obtain credits outside the classroom and worked with the DOE to build "Learn Everywhere" into their strategic plan.



A Parent's Right to Know What's Working

- **TEN Colorado** secured the creation of a commission, as well as a seat on it, to take a hard look at the state's accountability framework and to recommend updates.
- **ConnCAN** passed the Multilingual Learner's Bill of Rights, codifying information and support for families.



A Path to a Career

- **NewMexicoKidsCAN** created a workforce pathway to overcome licensure barriers for career tradespeople to teach Career and Technical Education (CTE) courses to students.
- **GeorgiaCAN** required new reporting on the success and reach of dual enrollment programs as the state prepares to expand pathways.



Over the next three years at 50CAN, we plan on expanding the number of state CANs from 10 to 15, which will move our organization from serving 17% of the country's children to 25%.

50CAN has a long history of using fellowships to support new voices and new leaders. In fact, three of the network's current advocacy campaigns-in Delaware, Hawaii and New Mexico-were created by 50CAN fellows.

As political divisions have grown in the country, we have seen an increasing interest in fellowship programs that bring people together around concrete, positive, innovative ideas. This is important not only because a climate of heightened division threatens our work, but because the best spokespeople, advocates and policy experts will be people who know how to work across differences. Because new ideas spread more rapidly through deep social, professional and institutional networks, we have made building these bridges a core goal of our National Voices, Changemakers and EPIC fellowships. Scaling them up to meet growing demand will be a key approach to ensure we have the people needed to drive this movement forward.

In 2023, to promote our vision to the public and spark new ideas, we:



Trained **333 new local advocates**, including parents, students and educators, to contribute their ideas and communicate their needs to the press, elected officials and other stakeholders.



Welcomed **14 new National Voices Fellows**, who obtained **197** media hits, including in Newsweek, the New York Post, the City Journal, Fox News and Spectrum.



We also welcomed **5 New York Voices Fellows** and **10 Next Gen Voices Fellows**, in the first regional and generational imprints of National Voices, with tailored curriculums and tactics.



Promoted our vision of the future through **78 national** and **107 local media hits**, including appearances in The Washington Post, the Hill and Education Next.



Authored **25** issues of our newsletter, *The New Reality Roundup*, sharing over **200** resources for advocates, educators and elected officials which were **viewed** more than **55,000 times**.



Recruited our first **William E. Simon Policy Fellow** to contribute new ideas and tactics to network leaders and local advocates.



50CAN President Derrell Bradford **testified** before the United States Congress on educational recovery and the pandemic.



With so many potential new leaders and voices, over the next three years at 50CAN we're doubling the number of messenger fellowships across the network, with new opportunities in specific geographies.

National Voices Fellowship applications for Cohort VII will open in October for interested applicants.


