

Preface

Over the past two decades, the American education landscape has seen significant shifts. While states across the country have worked to improve their school systems, families have been on their own parallel journey—seeking out more opportunities to prepare their children for an ever-changing world. Whether inside the classroom or out in the community, parents are navigating a growing maze of educational choices. Yet, despite meaningful progress, too many families still face daunting obstacles in finding the right educational opportunities for their children.

This survey report, "The State of Educational Opportunity in America," offers an unprecedented, state-by-state examination of how parents are tackling these challenges. We go beyond just a view of the classroom to explore a broader ecosystem of learning opportunities, from sports to afterschool programs to college pathways and more. Our goal is to shine a light on how parents perceive the current education landscape, elevate what is important to them and identify where they believe improvements are needed.

In the U.S., most education decisions are made at the state and local levels, but national surveys don't capture these crucial differences. We set out to change that. By conducting a survey large enough to provide a representative sample from all 50 states and D.C., we're offering a granular look at the challenges and opportunities parents experience in their own communities and putting that into a national and regional context.

Through this unique partnership between 5oCAN: The 5o-State Campaign for Achievement Now and Edge Research, we aim to understand the ways in which families are navigating educational choices, what resources are helping them succeed and what gaps remain. Our hope is that this data will help policymakers, educators and advocates—in every state and across all learning environments—make informed decisions about how to chart a path forward to the better future our kids deserve.

At its core, this report is not just about numbers or trends; it's about elevating the voices of families, whose perspectives and experiences are crucial to shaping a more welcoming, effective and supportive educational system. We are grateful to the more than 20,000 parents who contributed to this study, and we hope their participation helps spark meaningful change across the nation.

So, dig in. Let's make sure every parent's voice is heard, and every child gets the education they deserve.

Executive Summary

This survey report is designed to serve as an almanac of educational opportunity in America. In the more than 200 pages that follow, you will find all the results organized by question and then by state so that you can find the information most relevant to your community and your needs.

At the same time, before turning to those specific pages it will be helpful to get an overview of some of the broader trends that emerge when the results are examined in full. There is a lot of data to dig through with a survey like this given that 20,090 parents answered questions about themselves, their children and their communities. In fact, if all the possible cross tabulations were displayed it would result in a spreadsheet with over 4,600 rows and 200 columns of data. If you want to dig into that data yourself, you can find the complete survey questionnaire, the topline results and instructions on how to download the entire dataset at 50CAN.org.

One of the advantages of such a large sample size is that we can elevate the voices of parents who are often overlooked in the national debate. That includes parents in states with smaller populations like Vermont and Wyoming, as well as smaller racial and ethnic groups like American Indian and Alaskan Native. The data also includes parents who have chosen emerging forms of education like online schools, microschools and homeschool. We've strived to present their views in full and avoid obscuring their voices by rolling them into categories like "other."


Building upon the structure in the survey questionnaire itself, we have organized the results into five categories aligned with the five areas that parents tell us are important for their children's educational journeys:

- School quality and opportunity
- 1 Tutoring, summer and mental health
- Out of school activities
- Information and engagement
- College and career readiness

The "Results by Question" and "Results by State" sections that follow provide the full breath of the data collected. In this executive summary, we have focused on nine themes that cut across these categories and help provide context for the full results.

1. EVERY STATE REALLY IS DIFFERENT

As we travel across the country, one of the most common things we hear is "our state is different." And it turns out that's exactly what this survey reveals. In our Results by State section, we score the states on 15 indicators across the five categories of educational opportunity, and guess what? No two states have the same pattern of results.



2. INEQUALITY ISN'T JUST ABOUT SCHOOL

The survey examined participation in a range of out of school activities—from arts and organized sports; to religious programs, community service, and scouting; to leadership and mentoring programs. What we found is that students doing well inside the classroom also are much more likely to have the opportunity to participate in a wide range of activities outside the classroom. For instance, two-thirds (66%) of those whose parents report they get all A's participate in organized sports, compared to just four-in-10 (40%) who get mostly C's and D's, and only a quarter (24%) who get D's and F's. That same pattern holds true for most out of school activities surveyed.


At the same time, across every out of school activity, there are significant gaps in participation between low-, middle-and high-income parents—and these persist over time—from elementary school, through middle school, and into high school. And the two areas that have the biggest gaps in participation by income are also those that parents deem most important: organized sports, where there is a 35-point gap between low- and high-income participation, and the arts, where there is a 26-point participation gap.

3. THERE IS A LOT OF UNMET DEMAND

While large numbers of children do not participate in these out of school activities, it is not because of a lack of interest from their parents. For example, among those whose child has not attended an afterschool program in the last 12 months, over four-in-10 parents (43%) are interested in having their child do so in the future. This unmet demand is significantly higher among many of the groups who need afterschool programming the most: low-income families (46%), parents of students who struggle academically (50%), and parents of children with an IEP (57%).

Among high school families, there is also a big gap between the percentage of students who are taking advanced placement, dual enrollment and CTE courses compared to the percentage of parents whose children aren't enrolled but are interested in participating. For example, while only a quarter of high school parents (25%) say their child is taking at least one dual enrollment course, almost three-quarters (73%) of parents whose child isn't enrolled say they are interested in their participation. This unmet demand is strong across all household income levels: low (65%), middle (78%), and high (78%).

Student participation and unmet demand in college and career programs by household income




4. LACK OF OPPORTUNITY HITS THE MIDDLE CLASS, TOO

With many of the activities and experiences explored in this study, lack of opportunity is not just a phenomenon among low-income families. It is a middle-class challenge as well. In many cases, the challenges and barriers faced by middle-class families are much closer to that of low-income families than high-income families.

For example, when asked how confident they are that their child will be prepared for future success in a career, high-income parents (41%) are significantly more confident than both middle- (34%) and low-income parents (33%). Similarly, when asked how confident they are that their child will be prepared for admission into and success in college, high-income parents (42%) are significantly more confident than both middle- (32%) and low-income parents (30%). This suggests that an education opportunity agenda shouldn't overlook the middle class.


Percentage of parents who say they are extremely confident that their child will succeed in the workforce (left) or in college (right) by household income



5. THERE ARE HUGE SATISFACTION DIFFERENCES BY SCHOOL TYPE


It's impossible to understand differences in educational opportunity without looking at school type. In this survey, we were able to look at student and parent experiences across eight different types of schools. The differences are striking. For example, parents who send their kids to parochial/religious school (70% very satisfied), private school (65%) or homeschool (65%) are significantly more satisfied than those whose child attends a traditional public school (just 39%).

Percentage of parents who say they are very satisfied with their child's school by school type




The same patterns hold true when looking at the percentage of parents who say that if they could send their child to any school, they would send them to the school they go to today. While 87% of private school parents and 82% of parochial/religious school parents would make the same choice, the number drops to just 59% for traditional public school parents.

Differences in opportunity by school type extend far beyond school satisfaction, including to participation in sports. There are considerable gaps in access and opportunity for students being educated in microschool (52% of whom participate in sports), homeschool (34%) and virtual/online school (25%) compared to parochial/religious school (75%) and private/independent school (78%).

6. WHEN IT COMES TO MENTAL HEALTH SATISFACTION, TIMING MATTERS

The survey also investigated how satisfied parents are with the support their school provides for their child's emotional and mental health needs. Our large sample size allows us to break down the results by each individual grade from kindergarten through 12th grade. In K-3rd grade, over four-in-10 (41%-43%) parents feel good about the emotional and mental health support provided to their child. But starting in fourth grade, satisfaction declines seven points (to 35%). The transition from middle school to high school seems to be particularly challenging, with just 29% of the parents of 9th graders saying they are very satisfied with the schools' mental health support.

7. INCOME INFLUENCES INFORMATION

The survey also delved into the information and communication parents receive so they can be best equipped to help their child succeed in school and beyond. High-income parents are more likely to have attended a parent meeting, reviewed their school's performance compared to other schools, and feel as if they are familiar with school budget decisions. They tend to consult more people and channels for information about local education and issues and opportunities, while low-income parents rely most on their child's teacher for information.

8. STUDENTS WHO NEED THE MOST HELP AREN'T GETTING IT

Tutoring can be a very effective way to help kids catch up when they have fallen behind. But the students most likely to have had a tutor in the past year are those with "mostly A's and B's" (20%) and "mostly B's and C's" (24%).

Among parents whose child has not been tutored, it is the parents of the lowest performing students—those with "mostly C's and D's" (40%) and "mostly D's and F's (38%)—who want tutoring the most.


Percentage of parents whose child doesn't have a tutor who are very interested in a tutor



9. MIND THE URBAN-RURAL GAPS

Finally, when we look at tutoring, we also see a clear geographic divide. Urban students are more than twice as likely to have a tutor as rural students. This is true for tutoring and many other educational opportunities in our survey such as summer program participation, afterschool program participation and art, dance and music participation. It is clear that much more needs to be done to expand access to all the corners of a state.

Methodology

Edge Research conducted this nationwide survey of **20,090 U.S. parents and guardians of school-aged children** (K-12th grade), which includes between 301 and 427 surveys in each of the 50 states plus the District of Columbia. Respondents could take the survey in either English or Spanish, based on their preference. The survey was in the field from July 8 to August 22, 2024.

DATA COLLECTION

The survey used a mixed-mode methodology to reach as many households as possible. First, survey respondents were recruited using online, non-probability samples obtained via national opt-in consumer research panels. These surveys were mobile-optimized (meaning participants can take the survey on a PC or mobile device, which helps reach those who do not have internet access but do have a mobile data plan). In states where Edge Research was not able to collect at least 300 surveys using this method, they obtained supplementary text-to-web interviews.

SURVEY REPRESENTATIVENESS

As respondents entered the survey, they submitted demographic information, and quotas were set to ensure the sample is proportionately distributed in accordance with the most recent U.S. Census¹ and National Center for Education Statistics (NCES)² data on U.S. parents in each state. Quotas functioned by predetermining the number of desired respondents by gender identity, race, ethnicity, child's grade and grade level in each state. Once the desired number was reached with each quota group, it closed, and additional respondents were turned away.

After the survey came out of the field, Edge Research reviewed the data and applied additional weights by income, race/ethnicity, school level and school type within states. Once responses were weighted within state, data was then weighted by state to be proportionate nationally.

INCOME DEFINITIONS

In the pages that follow, we provide results for low-, middle- and high-income parents. These income buckets were calculated using the Pew Research Center's study on "The State of the American Middle Class" and their category definitions:

- Middle-income households are defined as those with an income that is two-thirds to double that of the U.S. median household income, after being adjusted for household size.
- Lower-income households have incomes less than two-thirds of the median
- High-income households have incomes that are more than double the median.

Following these definitions, Edge Research adjusted the incomes reported in the survey to reflect a three-person household using the equivalence scales technique. Pulling from the U.S. Census 2023 Annual Social and Economic Supplements, they used the three-person household income breaks of \$61,000 to \$183,000 as middle, and values above and below those thresholds as lower and upper income respectively.

DATA QUALITY CONTROL AND STANDARDS

Edge Research employed several practices to ensure data quality. The survey platform used reCAPTCHA to screen for bots. They also applied a third-party tool called Research Defender to screen out known bad actors and respondents with high survey-taking rates. In addition, data was monitored regularly while in the field. Once all responses were collected, they applied additional data cleaning processes, clearing data for cheating, speeding, inattentiveness, and AI-generated responses.

Edge Research follows the American Association for Public Opinion Research (AAPOR) Code of Professional Ethics and Practices⁴ to maintain the highest standards of competence, integrity, accountability, and transparency in public opinion and survey research work.

How to Read the Results

One challenge with a survey of this size was how to present the results in an accessible way that doesn't sacrifice the depth of insights. We decided to present the answers in two ways: first by each question and then by each state.

RESULTS BY QUESTION

The first section of this report provides the results of the survey across **24 questions**, one question at a time. For each of the questions, we provide four pages of results. These questions are presented in order across **five categories**, which with its own accent color: 1) School quality and opportunity (**pink**), 2) Tutoring, summer and mental health (**green**), 3) Out of school activities (**teal**), 4) Information and engagement (**purple**) and 5) College and career readiness (**orange**).

For yes/no questions, the results are presented as the percentage who said yes, rounded to the nearest whole number. For questions about parents' opinions and attitudes, we utilized a Likert scale and **reported out the percentage choosing the highest option**. For example, on question 1, which measures parents' satisfaction with their child's school, we present the percentage who answered that they were "very satisfied." This helps ground the comparison discussion in a high bar for success.



The **first page** of each four-page spread displays the results in the form of a map of all 50 states and D.C. A key provides the scale for the map and explains the numbers behind each of the four shades of blue. The darkest shade of blue is always the highest numbers and the lightest shade of blue is always the lowest numbers. The results are also broken out by demographic group for the national sample. For example, if the question measures school satisfaction, this section shows how school satisfaction varies across household income and parental education.

The **second page** provides the state results as a list, ordered from highest performing states at the top to lowest performing states at the bottom. This list shows the state average as a dark blue dot and the results for low-income families in a light shade of the section color and the results for middle- and high-income families as a darker shade of that color. It also includes additional breakouts of the national sample by school type and race/ethnicity.

The **third page** provides a look at the national results through additional breakouts by child characteristics such as their gender, special education status and average grades.

The **fourth page** provides a look at the national results through additional breakouts by parental characteristics such as marital status, political party and ideology.

RESULTS BY STATE

To help make it easier to look at a state's full results at a glance, we also present the results one state at a time. States are presented in alphabetical order, with each state's results shown over two pages. At the top of the first page is the number of parents who participated in the survey. We also provide a way to view the state's relative strengths and weaknesses through a circle with five wedges, one for each of the five categories of the survey: 1) School quality and opportunity (pink), 2) Tutoring, summer and mental health (green), 3) Out of school activities (teal), 4) Information and engagement (purple) and 5) College and career readiness (orange).



Each of the five categories is made up of three questions. These are presented below each category with the state's results compared to other states represented by a tier shown to the right of each question, from low to high. These tiers are scored from 1 (low) to 4 (high) and the scores across the three questions determine how many rows are colored in for the wedge (up to a possible number of 12 rows).

The state results for each question are presented in four circles: low-income, middle and high income, state average and national average.

By flipping between states, you can understand your state's results in the context of all the other states across America.










School Satisfaction by **School Type**



School Satisfaction by Child's Grades














School Satisfaction by Special Education




School Satisfaction by Child's Grade Level



School Satisfaction by Child's Gender




School Satisfaction by Geographic Area


School Satisfaction by Voted in Last Presidential Election


School Satisfaction by Political Party Affiliation








Would Make the Same Choice by School Type



















Feel They Have a Choice by Child's Grades




Feel They Have a Choice by Special Education




Feel They Have a Choice by Child's Grade Level




Feel They Have a Choice by Geographic Area

















Participation in Tutoring by Child's Grades


Participation in Tutoring by Child's Grade Level




Participation in Tutoring by Geographic Area




Participation in Tutoring by Political Party Affiliation








Unmet Demand for Tutoring by Child's Grades






Unmet Demand for Tutoring by Child's Grade Level




Unmet Demand for Tutoring by Geographic Area







SUMMER PROGRAM PARTICIPATION BY STATE














Volunteer or Service Participation by Child's Grade Level






